Call to Remembrance

When I was a boy soprano in an Episcopalian boys' and men's choir, I sang an anthem by Richard Farant entitled *Call to Remembrance*. It may be considered an old war-horse by some, but it is nonetheless a fine example of 16th-century English cathedral music. The piece is still published in several modern editions; apparently the horse is not yet dead.



My recollection of that somber yet uplifting anthem occurred as I read about the death of Gene Brooks in July. I encourage each of you to read Dr. Brooks's biography and the wonderful tribute to him by Hilary Apfelstadt, our national president, in the August issue of *The Choral Journal*. I was especially fortunate to know Dr. Brooks personally and professionally as a result of my first term as president of WVACDA. At the 1997 Leadership Conference in Lawton, OK, Gene announced that he was looking for an International Choirs Coordinator for the national convention in Chicago (1999). Curious about what the position entailed, I approached Gene to inquire and it was like I had just been reunited with my best friend for life. I had never met the man before, but that was the beginning of our friendship that included one of the highlights of my professional career: a 10-day trip to Russia, with Executive Director Brooks, to meet the conductors and choirs that I had planned itineraries for leading to their American tours and convention performances. My last contact with Gene was in front of the Charleston WV Convention Center at the 2005 Southern Division Convention. I hadn't spoken to him for over a year, but he asked me about my wife Alison (by name) and how my twin boys were doing in graduate school. I share that story with you to confirm everything Hilary says about Gene's personal characteristics, and to suggest that you never know what might happen when you volunteer for service in ACDA. At least the ACDA according to Dr. Gene Brooks.

The call to remembrance certainly applies to persons who have left this earth, but it may have many other contexts. At this time of year many of us are called to remember what

At this time of year, many of us are called to remember what getting out of bed before dawn is like, and eating lunch in twenty minutes at ten o'clock in the morning. Choral directors of all ages get a wakeup call about vocal health after speaking and singing for six hours per day, five days per week. Remember to take care of your instrument and stay hydrated!

When the school year begins we call upon our students to remember all of the vocal and choral techniques we have taught them, and we call upon each other to remember our shared musical goals for artistic choral performances. Our own capacity to remember may be tested as time marches on, patience gets thin, rehearsal time grows short, and performances draw near. 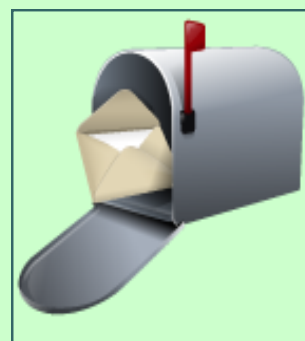

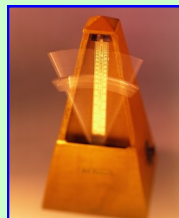

THE 8TH WORLD SYMPOSIUM ON CHORAL MUSIC, SPONSORED BY THE INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION FOR CHORAL MUSIC, WILL BE HELD IN COPENHAGEN, DENMARK, JULY 19-26, 2008. HELD ONCE EVERY THREE YEARS, THE SYMPOSIUM WILL FEATURE 29 INTERNATIONAL AND 12 DANISH CHOIRS REPRESENTING ALL TYPES OF ENSEMBLES FROM CHILDREN TO ADULT, AND PROMINENT CONDUCTORS, COMPOSERS, AND OTHER CHORAL SPECIALIST FROM AROUND THE GLOBE. A NATIVE OF CALIFORNIA, JOSHUA HABERMANN IS A GRADUATE OF GEORGETOWN UNIVERSITY AND THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AT AUSTIN, WHERE HE COMPLETED DOCTORAL STUDIES IN CONDUCTING WITH CRAIG HELLA JOHNSON. AS PROFESSOR OF MUSIC SAN FRANCISCO STATE UNIVERSITY HE DIRECTS THE CHORAL PROGRAM, AND TEACHES CHORAL LITERATURE, CONDUCTING, AND LYRIC DICTION.

AS A SINGER (TENOR) HE PERFORMS WITH THE OREGON BACH FESTIVAL CHORUS (EUGENE, OREGON), WHERE HE CAN BE HEARD ON THE GRAMMY-AWARD-WINNING RECORDING OF KRZYSZTOF PENDERECKI'S *CREDO*. OTHER PROJECTS INCLUDE TWO RECORDINGS WITH AUSTIN-BASED CONSPIRARE: *THROUGH THE GREEN FUSE*, AND *REQUIEM*, A GRAMMY NOMINEE FOR BEST CHORAL RECORDING IN 2006. MR. HABERMANN ALSO MAINTAINS AN INTEREST IN THE HAWAIIAN CHORAL TRADITION, AND SINGS PERIODICALLY WITH KAWAIOLAON *APUKANILEO*, AN ENSEMBLE DEDICATED TO PERFORMING AND PRESERVING THIS UNIQUE REPERTOIRE. OTHER RESEARCH INTERESTS INCLUDE LATIN AMERICAN AND NORDIC MUSIC. HIS DISSERTATION ON THE A CAPPELLA WORKS OF FINNISH COMPOSER EINOJUHAN RAUTAVAARA WAS A JULIUS HERFORD PRIZE FINALIST FOR MUSIC RESEARCH IN 1997.

JOSHUA HABERMANN'S LONG ASSOCIATION WITH THE SAN FRANCISCO SYMPHONY CHORUS BEGAN IN 1991, WHEN HE JOINED THE CHORUS AS A SINGER AND DICTION COACH. OVER THE COURSE OF 13 SEASONS HE HAS SUNG AND HELPED PREPARE BOTH THE STANDARD CANON AND LESSER-KNOWN WORKS OF CHORAL-ORCHESTRAL REPERTOIRE. FROM 1996-2006 MR. HABERMANN WAS ASSISTANT TO VANCE GEORGE, AND IN 2006-2007 SERVED AS INTERIM DIRECTOR UPON GEORGE'S RETIREMENT.

IN THAT CAPACITY HE PREPARED THE CHORUS FOR PERFORMANCES WITH CONDUCTORS MICHAEL TILSON THOMAS AND CHARLES DUTOIT IN CONCERTS OF MOZART, AND BERLIOZ: *LA DAMNATION DE FAUST*. BUILDING BRIDGES IN LOUISVILLE

A LIFETIME OF MEMORIES

ACC RECENT GRADUATES**

ON SUNDAY, JULY 8, THE APPALACHIAN CHILDREN'S CHORUS DEPARTED FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF CHARLESTON (THE HOME OF THE FOREVER LEGENDARY TUESDAY REHEARSALS) ON A CHARTER BUS. AS WE RODE TO THE AIRPORT, THEN BACK TO THE HOTEL TO FIND LOST PURSES, AND FINALLY THROUGH ALL OF THE SECURITY, WE BEGAN TO PREPARE FOR THE LONGEST VOYAGE THAT MANY OF US WILL EVER TAKE. WE WERE HEADED FOR THE ILLUSTRIOUS OAHU ISLAND OF HAWAII.

OF COURSE, THE LOGICAL THING TO DO WHILE SITTING ON A FOUR AND A HALF HOUR FLIGHT TO PHOENIX AND THEN ANOTHER SIX AND A HALF HOUR FLIGHT TO HONOLULU, HAWAII WOULD BE TO SLEEP, BUT HONESTLY, WE WERE HEADED TO HAWAII, SLEEP WAS DEFINITELY NOT AN OPTION. BESIDES BEING TOO EXCITED ABOUT OUR DESTINATION, WE KNEW WE HAD A LOT OF MUSIC TO MEMORIZE AND PRACTICE. FOR THE CHILDREN IN THE ACC PROGRAM THIS WAS NOT JUST A SWEET VACATION; WE WERE HEADED TO HAWAII FOR THE PACIFIC RIM CHILDREN'S FESTIVAL WITH 13 CHOIRS FROM THE UNITED STATES, CANADA, AND EVEN HAWAII ITSELF WITH MR. HENRY LECK AS OUR DIRECTOR. NEARLY THREE HUNDRED YOUNG MEN AND WOMEN SANG FIFTEEN SONGS WITH THIRTEEN OF THEM BEING IN LANGUAGES OTHER THAN ENGLISH, INCLUDING SONGS IN CHINESE, JAPANESE, TRADITIONAL PILIPINO, AND, OF COURSE, HAWAIIAN IN TWO MASS PERFORMANCES.

UPON ARRIVING IN HAWAII, WE WERE GREETED BY OUR TOUR GUIDE WHOSE MIDDLE NAME ALONE HAD FIFTY-TWO LETTERS. THE WEATHER FOR THE DAY AND THE MAJORITY OF THE TIME WAS HUMID, BUT RELATIVELY COOL. FINALLY, WE WERE IN HAWAII, LIVING OUT THE TRIP THAT MANY OF US HAD BEEN DREAMING ABOUT FOR THREE LONG YEARS OF HARD WORK AND FUNDRAISING. OBVIOUSLY OUR ADRENALINE FORCED US TO FIND THE BEACH AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE AND DIVE IN. FULLY CLOTHED, WE WADED IN THE WATER, BUT UNFORTUNATELY, SOME OF US "FELL" AND WERE SOAKED! YET, THANKFULLY NO ONE'S SAFETY GREEN T-SHIRT WAS SERIOUSLY DAMAGED.

THE NEXT DAY RESEMBLED A DAY IN AN ATHLETIC CAMP FOR OLYMPIANS AND IT WAS WORTH IT ALL. THE CLIMB TO THE TOP OF THE EXTINCT VOLCANO DIAMOND HEAD WAS AN UNSTEADY HIKE UP A STEEP, RUGGED TRAIL WITH TWO TUNNELS AND HUNDREDS OF STAIRS. YET NOTHING COULD HAVE STOPPED US FROM ENJOYING THE ABSOLUTELY BREATHTAKING VIEW FROM THE TOP. TO ONE SIDE YOU COULD SEE GREEN MOUNTAINS AND THE LARGE CITY OF HONOLULU AND ON THE OTHER SIDE WAS THE OCEAN THAT WAS A COLOR OF BLUE SO UTTERLY BEAUTIFUL IT SURPASSED ALL RATIONAL THOUGHT AND ENTERED OUR MEMORIES STRAIGHT THROUGH OUR HEARTS.

JUST AFTER LEAVING DIAMOND HEAD WE DROVE TO THE DOLE PLANTATION. BECAUSE IT RAINS JUST ABOUT EVERYDAY IN HAWAII THEY HAVE SOME OF THE BEST FRUITS IN THE WORLD; SO WHERE BETTER THAN A PINEAPPLE PLANTATION TO PROVE IT? IT WAS SOMETHING THAT TURNED OUT BETTER THAN EXPECTED AND WAS IMPOSSIBLE NOT TO LOVE. THAT NIGHT ALSO MARKED THE OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE FESTIVAL WITH AN IMPRESSIVE DINNER AND FIRE-HANDLING SHOW FOR ALL GATHERED CHOIRS TO ENJOY.

THE FOLLOWING WE REHEARSED ON THE CAMPUS OF BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII WITH ALL OF THE CHOIRS TOGETHER. BREAKFAST, REHEARSE, LUNCH, REHEARSE, AND FINALLY DINNER. BECOMING COMFORTABLE WITH THE MUSIC ON OUR OWN DURING DAILY REHEARSALS THE WEEK BEFORE COMING TO HAWAII WAS DEFINITELY NOT AS HARD AS BECOMING COMFORTABLE WITH THE SOUND OF THREE HUNDRED DIFFERENT PEOPLE ALL ON DIFFERENT LEVELS OF KNOWING THE MUSIC. ACC WAS FORTUNATE ENOUGH TO HAVE HAD THE EXTRA WEEK OF PRACTICE BECAUSE MR. LECK WAS VERY FAST-PACED AND CONSTANTLY DEMANDED EXCELLENCE. AFTER

DINNER WE WALKED TO THE POLYNESIAN CULTURE CENTER AND TO BE ENTERTAINED BY FIRE DANCERS, HULA DANCERS, AND A PLETHORA OF OTHER DANCES, SONGS, AND OTHER FORMS OF ARTISTIC MOVEMENT. LITTLE DID WE KNOW THAT NIGHT BUT COME THE NEXT DAY, WE WOULD BE

LEARNING MANY OF THE DANCES.

ON THURSDAY, AFTER BREAKFAST, WE WERE IMMEDIATELY SHIPPED BACK TO THE POLYNESIAN CULTURE CENTER AND ALL THREE HUNDRED OF US WERE SEPARATED INTO THE FOUR MAIN ISLANDS OF POLYNESIA; NEW ZEALAND, HAWAII, TAHITI, AND SAMOA. WE LEARNED TO HULA, SING IN OUR ISLAND'S NATIVE LANGUAGE, DANCE WITH POI BALLS, AND EVEN LEARNED OUT TO MAKE MUSIC BY THROWING STICKS TO EACH OTHER.

EACH CHOIR, EITHER THAT NIGHT OR THE NEXT, PERFORMED SOME OF THEIR OWN REPERTOIRE FOR THE ENTERTAINMENT OF THE OTHER CHOIRS. BEING THAT IT WAS THE LAST PERFORMANCE FOR THE GRADUATES OF THE ACC PROGRAM THERE WERE SOME TEARS, BUT THEY WERE TEARS OF SAYING GOODBYE, KNOWING THAT ACC WAS ONE OF THE BEST EXPERIENCES THAT ANY OF US COULD HAVE ASKED FOR.

ON SATURDAY, WE HAD ANOTHER ALL-DAY REHEARSAL IN PREPARATION FOR OUR FIRST MASS PERFORMANCE. THIS TIME MUSIC HAD TO BE MEMORIZED AND ABSOLUTELY PERFECT. ARRANGING ALL THREE HUNDRED OF US ON STAGE TOOK AN HOUR ALONE. WE WERE IN TWELVE STRAIGHT ROWS AND, IF THAT WASN'T HARD ENOUGH, EVERYONE HAD TO BE IN THEIR CORRECT SECTION AS WELL AS BE IN ORDER ACCORDING TO HEIGHT. WE PERFORMED A PROFESSIONAL, YET RELAXED, CONCERT IN THE GYMNASIUM AT BYU. WHAT WAS REALLY NEAT WAS THE FACT THAT IN BETWEEN SOME OF OUR SONGS THERE WERE PERFORMERS WHO REPRESENTED THE COUNTRY WHOSE LANGUAGE WE SANG IN NEXT. WE SAW PROFESSIONAL HULA DANCERS, TAIKO DRUMMERS, AND EVEN A SINGING/UKULELE PLAYING TROUPE FROM CANADA.

ON SUNDAY, JULY 15 WE HAD A CONCERT IN THE BLAISDELL PERFORMANCE HALL. THIS CONCERT WAS OUR BIG EVENT, WHICH WE PULLED OFF AMAZINGLY WELL! EVERYONE KNEW THEIR MUSIC, VERY FEW MADE MISTAKES, AND EVERYONE HAD A GREAT TIME. TO CELEBRATE, WE HAD A PIZZA PARTY AND WENT SWIMMING IN OUR HOTEL'S POOL.

BY THE FOLLOWING TUESDAY WE WERE BEGINNING TO FEEL THE STRESS OF THE TRIP. WITH TEMPERaments RUNNING UNSTEADILY, WE NEEDED A DEFINITE PICK-ME-UP. WHILE THE PEARL HARBOR MEMORIAL WOULD NOT HAVE BEEN OUR FIRST CHOICE FOR THAT REASON, WE DEFINITELY WERE GLAD THAT WE WENT. WE REVELED IN THE HISTORY THAT WAS SHOWN TO US IN THE MUSEUM AND BY THE TIME WE LEFT EACH ONE OF US COULD SAY THE WORD APPRECIATION WITH MEANING. AFTER SOME MORE FREE TIME, WE JOINED THE OTHER CHOIRS AND HAD THE CLOSING CEREMONY OF THE FESTIVAL. WE ATE DINNER, PLAYED RELAY GAMES AND THE VERY LAST EVENT WAS WALKING TO THE BEACH AND SINGING "ALOHA 'Oe" AS THE SUN WENT DOWN OVER THE HORIZON.

NO MATTER WHAT HAPPENED OR DIDN'T HAPPEN ON THE TRIP ALL THIRTY-FOUR CHORISTERS AND SEVENTEEN CHAPERONES WERE VERY THANKFUL TO HAVE THIS OPPORTUNITY. ACC'S DIRECTOR MRS. SELINA MIDKIFF WAS AT HER BEST WITH HER AMAZING LEADERSHIP AND KNACK FOR NOT LOSING OR DAMAGING ANYTHING
