A native of Maryland, Eberhardt is well known throughout the east coast. His choirs have consistently garnered top prizes in local, state, and national festivals. In 2023 he conducted the Maryland Junior All State Chorus after 15 years of conducting area regional choirs from Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Maryland. Choral music has led him to conduct at The Kennedy Center, Strathmore Music Hall, The Meyerhoff, and other regional concert venues. In addition to his work as a conductor, he has served Maryland as the Maryland Choral Educators Association President.

As an Educator, Mr. Eberhardt has taught every level student from PreK to graduate students at various institutions for learning including, Towson University, Trinity College, Marriotts Ridge High School, and Shady Grove Middle School. At the inception of Red Bridge Studios Mr. Eberhardt had a vocal studio of over 30 thriving students that have all gone on to prestigious Conservatory type experiences and beyond.

Mr. Eberhardt, a Yale Symposium participant, and a writer for the 2014 National Association for Music Education national core arts standards for music, remains an active clinician throughout the Metropolitan area, presenting locally and regionally with American Choral Directors Association, Maryland Music Educators Association, Festivals of Music, and others. He has also worked extensively on issues of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion through The Peabody Diversity Task Force. His work as an arts advocate has earned him many awards and accolades. Some of his proudest accomplishments include Howard County Teacher of the Year, Choral Director of Note in the Choral Director Magazine, Grammy Music Educator of the year semi-finalist, and Yale Distinguished Music Educator Award.

Conductor: Dr. Jeffrey Allen Murdock High School All-State Chamber Choir

Dr. Jeffrey Allen Murdock is internationally known as a conductor, clinician, and music educator. He currently serves as Director of Choral Activities, Professor of Music, and Director of the Arkansas Center for Black Music at the University of Arkansas. He is a 2016 Connor Endowed Faculty Fellow in the J. William Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, a 2018 recipient of the Golden Tusk Award, the 2019 Most Outstanding Faculty Member among all university faculty, and the 2021 GRAMMY Music Educator of the Year.

Dr. Murdock appears regularly in concert, recital, and stage performances, having previously conducted the Arkansas Philharmonic Orchestra, the Memphis Symphony Orchestra, the (Mississippi) Gulf Coast Symphony and has also performed as a soloist with the Fort Smith Symphony, the Memphis Symphony, the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra, and the Southern Mississippi Opera. Dr. Murdock's love of scholarship and performance has led him to study and perform around the world.



As a music educator, he loves to invest his knowledge and experience in the next generation of young musicians through clinic opportunities with secondary choral programs, conducting honor choruses, and mentoring choral music educators. Dr. Murdock is highly sought after as a clinician in the field of choral music and education, having conducted All-State and All-Region choirs, or headlined conferences in 27 states and 7 countries. In 2013, he made his Carnegie Hall debut conducting the Millington Chorale in a well-received concert of diverse repertoire. The evening concert featuring the ensemble was praised for its preparation and the ensemble's maturity of sound.

While Dr. Murdock is an accomplished classical musician, he is also a skilled Gospel musician. He has served on the conducting staff of the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc. and has collaborated with Gospel recording artists, including Donnie McClurkin, Richard Smallwood, Mary Mary, Marvin Winans, Marvin Sapp, Lisa Knowles, Kathy Taylor, and numerous others.

Dr. Murdock's research interests include cultural hegemony in choral music education, social justice in music education, culturally responsive pedagogy in music education, and music in urban schools. He has been invited to present at the National Research Conference for the National Association for Music Education (NAfME) as well as two World Conferences of the International Society for Music Education (ISME) – (Glasgow, U.K., and Helsinki, Finland). Dr. Murdock is also a frequent research presenter at local and regional conferences of the American Choral Directors' Association (ACDA) where he is president-elect of the Southwestern Division (SWACDA), past president of the Arkansas Chapter, and serves on the national subcommittee for diversity. Dr. Murdock holds both Bachelor of Music Education and Master of Music in Conducting degrees from the University of Southern Mississippi and the Doctor of Philosophy degree in Music Education from the University of Memphis. In addition to NAfME and ACDA, his professional memberships include the ASCAP and the National Collegiate Choral Organization (NCCO). He is also a member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Fraternity of America, and Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Incorporated.

Dr. Murdock is married to the Reverend R. Janae Pitts-Murdock, Senior Pastor of the Light of the World Christian Church Indianapolis, Indiana, and they have two amazing children, Jeffrey Allen Murdock, III, and John Patrick Alexander Murdock.



Conductor: Mr. Vincent Oakes All-State Junior High/Middle School Honor Choir

Vincent Oakes is in his twentieth year as Artistic Director of the Chattanooga Boys Choir. He earned the Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of Florida and Master of Sacred Music degree in Choral Conducting from Emory University, studying under James Morrow and Eric Nelson. In addition to teaching public school choral music and serving churches in Florida, Georgia, and Tennessee, he has also served as music director of the Emory University Exodus Singers and the Candler School of Theology Youth Theological Initiative. A frequent choral clinician and guest conductor of honor and festival choirs, recent conducting engagements have included the Vocalizze Choral Festival in Portugal, the ACDA International Conductors Exchange Program in Cuba, the Bangkok International Choral Festival in Thailand, and honor choirs throughout the United States.

Mr. Oakes has also been a conductor and clinician at the Lake Junaluska, Massenetta Springs, and Montreat worship music conferences and a clinician on conducting, choral literacy and musicianship, and working with the adolescent singing voice. He has published articles and reviews in Choral Journal and has authored chapter on child and adolescent voices in the textbooks Choral Pedagogy by Robert Sataloff and Brenda Smith and Class Voice: Fundamental Skills for Lifelong Singing by Ron Burrichter and Brenda Smith.

Mr. Oakes is an active member of National Association for Music Education and the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA), of which he served as Southern Division Chair of Boychoir Repertoire & Standards from 2005-2011. He is a Past-President of Tennessee ACDA and served as President of ACDA's eleven-state Southern Region from 2019-2021, chairing its Lift Every Voice conference in Mobile, AL in 2020. Mr. Oakes is also the Chair of the Fine Arts Department and Director of Choral Music at the Baylor School in Chattanooga, where he conducts four student ensembles and the faculty choir. He received Baylor's 2016 Ireland Chair for Distinguished Teaching and the Belz-Lipman Award for Excellence in Holocaust Education from the Tennessee Holocaust Commission in 2021.

Honor Choir Accompanists

John Morrison - Collegiate Honor Choir



John Morrison is an Assistant Professor of Music at Fairmont State University in the Department of Humanities where he is the director and accompanist of the Collegiate Singers and Community Choir, and has been on the music faculty for 16 years. Mr. Morrison has served as the WVACDA Collegiate Honor Choir accompanist since 2015, and the WV All State Children's Chorus accompanist since 2016. He was the 2016 vocal accompanist for the Governor's School for the Arts, and has worked as a staff accompanist at the Interlochen Arts Camp in Michigan.

Mr. Morrison served as the President of the West Virginia Music Teachers Association as well as in other WVMTA roles such as conference site coordinator. In 2020, Mr. Morrison received the WVMTA Teacher of the Year award and in 2022 he received the WVMTA Distinguished Leader of the Year Award. John has been the music director and organist at the First Presbyterian Church of Fairmont since 2009 where he directs the Chancel Choir and Cambridge Handbell Choir. John received a double Bachelor's Degree in Piano Performance and French and a Master's Degree in Piano Performance from WVU. His piano studies were with Dr. Marina Schmidt-Lupinacci, Dr. Peter Amstutz, and Dr. Christine Kefferstan.

Graham Sterling is a senior piano performance major at West Virginia University planning on pursuing his master's in collaborative piano after completing his bachelor's degree.

He is an Appalachian music minor and plays fiddle in the WVU bluegrass band. He is from Masontown, PA where he helps to run the family farm. In his free time, he enjoys hunting, fishing, and skiing.

Madeline Hoover - All-State Junior High/Middle School Honor Choir



Hailing from upstate New York, Madeline Hoover is an experienced recitalist, church musician, teacher, and collaborator. They earned their bachelor's degree in piano performance from Mansfield University, where they won the MU Concerto Competition. They were the accompanist for all the university's choirs, including the award-winning MU Concert Choir. With the Concert Choir, Hoover played in Carnegie Hall, participated in the Harmonie Festival in Limberg, Germany, and recorded several albums.

After Mansfield, Hoover earned a master's degree in piano performance from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. They are currently pursuing a doctorate in piano performance from WVU, studying with Dr. Peter Amstutz. At WVU, Hoover holds a graduate assistantship as the accompanist for the Mountaineer Singers, Mountaineer Chorus, and Chamber Singers.

Interest Session Descriptions:

"The Student-Engaged Rehearsal:

Strategies to Keep Rehearsals Dynamic, Engaging, and Productive" Vincent Oakes, 2024 Middle School/Jr. High School Honor Choir Conductor

In this session, Vincent Oakes will review strategies and tools for opening up the rehearsal process to solicit and include singer feedback, engagement, and self-directed improvement towards the goal of overall progress for the choral ensemble.

"Choral Configuration: Considerations for the Choral Music Educator" Kym Scott, West Virginia University

Acoustical placement, formation, and spacing between singers may cause noticeable transformation to the sound of a choir. This session will examine various placement options for choirs of all levels, discuss pros and cons, and include practical examples and demonstrations.

"Singing Specific Articulation: Promoting Ease, Efficiency, and Clarity" Thomas Erik Angerhofer, West Virginia University

Back in the 1960's, Noam Chomsky coined the term "Basis of Articulation" to refer to the place of readiness from which the articulators can transition efficiently through the habitual movement patterns of a particular language. Singing has different requirements than speech, including projection, intonation, and duration; hence, it requires a different articulatory setting to encourage muscular and acoustic efficiency. In addition to covering the science, participants will leave with exercises and tools that they can use with their ensembles to promote ease and improve tuning by encouraging a uniform approach to articulation in singing.

"Back to Singing: Running an Efficient Choral Rehearsal" Kent Hatteberg, University of Louisville

Want to run a fast-paced rehearsal? Want to add variety to your rehearsals? Want to save time? This session will demonstrate strategies to lead efficient, engaging choral rehearsals. It will offer rehearsal techniques to improve the rhythmic awareness of your singers. Methods to develop the aural skills of your singers and incorporate improved listening throughout the rehearsal will be demonstrated. Concepts to improve choral diction will be presented. Attendees will hear the differences between equal temperament, mean tone, just scale, and Pythagorean tuning.

"Meta-Messaging: The Key to an Effective Choral Rehearsal" Steven Grives, Shepherd University

Meta-message (n.): an underlying meaning or implicit message Metacommunication: the sum of your verbal and non-verbal communication

Inspired by the famous conducting video, "What They See Is What You Get" (Eichenberger), this session explores the myriad of ways that meta-messaging and metacommunication can improve the effectiveness and results of the choral rehearsal. The session will be a simulated rehearsal where participants will experience how non-verbal meta-messages can be used to reinforce rehearsal and program goals. Similarly, the session will explore how non-intentional meta-messages can inhibit in rehearsal. From articulating broad goals for your choral program to executing the details of a daily rehearsal, examining one style of metacommunication and use of meta-messaging can lead to more productive rehearsals and better communication between conductor and ensemble. This session is appropriate for choir directors at any level.

"Creating a Culturally Responsive, Equitable, and Anti-Racist Classroom" Jeffery A. Murdock, 2024 High School Honor Choir Conductor

Every student, every day, is deserving of a high-qualify music education experience. In this session, participants will be equipped with strategies that will help each student who enters our spaces of learning feel seen, heard, and respected, regardless of race, gender, socioeconomic status or other potentially marginalizing factors.

The Jean Singer Award

The Jean Singer Award for Distinguished Service to Choral Music in West Virginia was established in 2000 during the presidency of Dr. David Castleberry. Jean Singer, longtime director of the Parkersburg High School A Capella Choir, was selected as the first recipient and the award was named for her in recognition of her excellence to the choral art. Note: The Parkersburg High School A Cappella Choir under her direction is the only West Virginia choir selected to perform at a national ACDA Conference – Nashville, TN, in 1983.

Though the inception of the award began as an annual honor, it was voted on by the executive board in 2007 that the honor can be awarded in the second year of the President's two-year term.

History of the American Choral Directors Association

In February 1959, a group of 35 choral conductors from around the United States met in Kansas City, Missouri, during the Music Teachers National Association's (MTNA) biennial conference. This group created the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA) and approved its original ten purposes, which still stand largely unmodified today. The association evolved over its first decade to include divisions modeled after those of the National Association for Music Education (formerly MENC) and state chapters. ACDA was founded to serve the professional needs of all choir directors, and as a result, membership grew steadily from the initial 35 choral directors who attended that meeting to 111 charter members, and later to tens of thousands of members around the world."

From its origin, ACDA has promoted excellence in choral music through its workshops, symposia, choral program exchanges, international efforts, and especially through its conventions. Early conferences were held in conjunction with MENC conventions. Like present-day conferences, they offered reading sessions, interest sessions, panel discussions, and concert sessions. In 1960, at the first conference held in conjunction with MENC, five choirs performed. By 1971, the Association had matured to the point where it could offer its own independent conference. That conference took place in Kansas City, Missouri, at the Muehlebach Hotel, the same site as the first organizing meeting. The first international choirs performed at the 1973 conference, also held in Kansas City, Missouri, and by 1977, conference attendance had grown to the point where dual-track interest sessions were added. The 1980s saw a refinement of the conference system. Performance halls were used instead of ballrooms beginning in 1981. Honor choirs began singing at ACDA conferences in 1983. Again, by the 1990s, conference attendance had grown to a point where dual and triple tracks became necessary. Dual tracks were offered beginning in 1993, and the first triple-track conference followed in 1999. The most elaborate track system was offered in 2005, where conference attendees followed six tracks. In its history, the conferences have been expanded and refined but always with the commitment to improving the experience of choral music excellence and education.

Throughout its history, ACDA has honored both its members for their contributions to the choral art and quality choral composition through its competitions and commissions. From the Schmitt and Pepper Awards for Choral Composition in 1962 to the Raymond W. Brock Student Composition Competition, ACDA has worked to recognize and reward superior choral music, research in the choral art, excellence in conducting and teaching, quality newsletters, superb student organizations, and promise for the future of choral conducting. Equally important have been the pieces commissioned by ACDA, reflecting the Association's commitment to fostering superior-quality composition.

Over the course of ACDA's long history, its leadership has helped it remain true to its purposes. The organization that decided in 1959 to promote excellence in choral music through performance, composition, publication, research, teaching, and advocacy has maintained and evolved those goals into the organization that exists today.

In 2019 ACDA celebrated it's sixtieth birthday, holding a special ceremony in the Muehlebach Hotel, the very location of its first meeting

- To foster and promote choral singing, which will provide artistic, cultural, and spiritual experiences for the participants.
- To foster and promote the finest types of choral music to make these experiences possible.
- To foster and encourage rehearsal procedures conducive to attaining the highest possible level of musicianship and artistic performance.
- To foster and promote the organization and development of choral groups of all types in schools and colleges.
- To foster and promote the development of choral music in the church and synagogue.
- To foster and promote the organization and development of choral societies in cities and communities.
- To foster and promote understanding of choral music as an important medium of contemporary artistic expression.
- To foster and promote significant research in the field of choral music.
- To foster and encourage choral composition of superior quality.
- To cooperate with all organizations dedicated to the development of musical culture in America.
- To foster and promote international exchange programs involving performing groups, conductors, and composers.
- To disseminate professional news and information about choral music.


